> get to enjoy some great food! Ten great participants aged 6-12 got to slice and dice vegetables, learn basic cooking techniques and bake some delicious meals.

> We worked additional life-skills training into the program, including the value of hand washing and kitchen safety rules. We also learned through creative skits within a team setting about how to behave at the table (or rather, how not to

behave, as that is a lot more fun to present!). Our teams that day were "The Brits" and "The Other Guys". They had fifteen minutes to put together their skit and practice it, and then it was presentation time! Some of the kids were a little nervous, but the fun nature of their skits helped them get over their stage fright. We laughed and laughed watching the kids mime gobbling their food,



putting their elbows on the table and making rude noises.

Afterwards, they would switch into proper etiquette and politely ask for the salt, use a knife and fork, and chew with their mouths closed. The leaders awarded points for enthusiasm and including the most table manners in their skits. We also included the applause-o-metre into our decision. The prize: knowing that they had a sweet victory and could behave well at the table. (Bridget gives a big shout out to the winning team, "The Brits")

The Leadership Training Helped Me Grow Interview with Ingrid

"Now I know where problems come from" says Ingrid, a young woman who took the leadership training program at the Lighthouse last summer. Ingrid migrated to Canada with her

mother and three siblings, seeking safety. After much pain and

suffering, and a long process of waiting for their refugee case to be heard, they were given convention refugee status.

Taking the leadership training has been of utmost importance for Ingrid, for it has helped her to know how social problems such as economic violence, racism, gender discrimination and the like impact communities, societies and families. Having lost her father in Colombia due to systemic violence, she has words now to make meaning of what happened. She feels that solutions can be found to prevent violence, and that she can also be part of the solution. This is something she did not know before the training.

Further, through this leadership training she also learned the importance of team-work using a participatory style of leadership, where decision-making power is shared and where people learn from each other. She has also learned the importance, in a leadership role, of being conscious of environmental factors as well as socio-economic factors in making decisions. This is all new to Ingrid, but she feels she has grown a lot as a person through this experience. What I find ultimately incredible is that she has found healing in learning where problems come from and in giving back to the community.

The Lighthouse continues to look for new opportunities to raise funds. This year we have five different events. These initiatives are:


- The Annual Phone a Thon which takes place in May.


