Beyond September 30th

This past September 30th 2021 marked the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation as well as Orange Shirt Day. Both are observed as a step to honour the children who survived residential schools and to remember those who did not. While these dates are helpful as intentional steps to listen, learn, raise awareness, and respond to the history of Indigenous peoples, it is equally as important to continue our learning and support outside of these scheduled dates.

The Lighthouse's Neighbourhood Food Bank is a member agency of Daily Bread Food Bank. As a member agency our Neighbourhood Food Bank Program is committed to keeping up with our community member records for those who are willing to share. What has been illuminating is the information gleaned across our city and fellow member agency food banks. Every year Daily Bread Food Bank, in partnership with North York Harvest Food Bank, publishes a *Who's Hungry Report*, which profiles the experiences of poverty and food insecurity among our collective community members. This year's report spoke on the reality of food insecurity and





stated that food insecurity is highest among Black households (28.9%) and Indigenous households (28.2%) in Canada. Food insecurity is a symptom of poverty. However, socioeconomic status is only one layer of oppression for food bank clients. Race, disability, immigration status, gender, sexuality and mental health/addictions are not inherently barriers to living a life with dignity. Rather, discrimination and barriers to education, employment, and prosperity disproportionately affect these communities, often in overlapping or intersectional ways, (Daily Bread Food Bank, 2020). We recognize this is a reality within Canada and that these barriers disproportionately face Indigenous peoples.

A person's sense of wellness, ability to break barriers and build an empowered community, comes from acknowledging the holistic aspect of the work required in seeking to respond to these intersectional needs. At The Lighthouse we play a role in the services we provide through our food bank program, meal program, income tax clinic program, volunteer program, partnerships, etc. While we play these roles of community support, we recognize there is much more work to be done when it comes to the work of truth and reconciliation. We also acknowledge that other voices are far better suited to be the leading voice in upholding Indigenous peoples rights, culture and future.

We are so grateful to have incredible Indigenous friends, volunteers, and community members who share their wisdom and care. This year a long-time volunteer of ours, Jason Newby connected The Lighthouse with an amazing organization called The Thunder Woman Healing Lodge Society (TWHL). This organization provides trauma-informed, culturally appropriate services for First Nation (Status and Non-Status), Inuit, and Metis people. TWHL works with 2SLGBTQIA+ women exiting the justice system in recognition of the need to break a cycle of its overrepresentation of Indigenous women... *To be continued on page 2*

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TWHL focuses on reconnecting formerly incarcerated Indigenous women with their culture, spirituality,

communities, as well as responding to basic needs. TWHL has been engaged in a unique housing project called The Lodge Project, which aims to build a six-storey Lodge designed to uniquely combine wraparound supports and transitional housing for formerly incarcerated Indigenous women. This organization has been doing incredible work for Indigenous peoples and they are not alone. There are many Indigenous run and Indigenous focused organizations and support services across the city and we hope more to come.


Recently, Jason Newby initiated a connection between TWHL and The Lighthouse where TWHL arranged to donate hygiene products and backpacks to The Lighthouse Neighbourhood Food Bank from the overstock of their backpack program. We were so touched when a large van loaded with backpacks that contained hygiene products, parked out front of The Lighthouse. TWHL staff and volunteers began carrying donations into our building. As the bags were being carried in, Sheena, a staff person of TWHL, smiled brightly and said, "We just share the wealth." Volunteers, students and staff were deeply touched that this organization, made up of Indigenous people, who currently are working against systemic barriers and injustice, were also so kind and eager to share the wealth. After observing the large amount of donations, Lighthouse volunteer Jason simply said "It is part of our culture to help our community, to help anyone in need, Indigenous or not."

When we talk about truth and reconciliation we need to center the voices of those that should lead us. Indigenous peoples and organizations are who we must support, uplift, and look to as leaders. We want to encourage our readers and supporters to research local indigenous organizations in their communities to support and learn from. We look forward to continuing to build friendships and partnerships





with Indigenous organizations and to continue our learning so that we can be active allies. To those like our Indigenous volunteers and The Thunder Woman Healing Lodge Society, we say thank you for your incredible work and support.







Recently, The Lighthouse community was deeply saddened by the recent news of the passing of a current board member. Ed Boekee passed after finding out only five weeks prior that he had cancer. Ed Boekee has been part of The Lighthouse since the early 1980's. He was part of the Bible study formed by refugees arriving in Canada with the help of The Lighthouse. This group would later become All Nations Christian Fellowship Church (ANCF). Ed played an important role in the formation of ANCF and its continued growth. Ed maintained a deep love for The Lighthouse. He was a Board member in the late 1980's as well as the early 1990's. He joined the Board again in 2018 until his passing in August 2021. The Lighthouse community, the Board and staff will miss our brother Ed Boekee. We celebrate his incredible love for the work of The Lighthouse and for his community and we are inspired by him. We hope to honour his memory by continuing to provide unconditional love and service to those in need.
